Amy - Dwell. In January '24, I read a book about a missionary who prayed that God would do "whatever it takes" to help the new converts learn to pray and the answer was a difficult circumstance that drove the people to prayer. I too have lived with a God-given desire to increase my prayer life and so I prayed that He would do "whatever it took" to grow that in my life.

The answer came in a time of stress filled burnout. I entered the night shaking and heart racing as I felt surges of adrenaline pump through me for several hours, preventing sleep. My insides felt so knotted up, it was a chore to force down a few mouthfuls at meal times. It

was pretty miserable but incredibly I felt at peace.

When I was up at night, instead of fretting about how much I needed to sleep, I would quote scripture to myself over and over through the hours I lay there. Psalm 34 is one I used a lot. During the day, I would be so emptied physically that I didn't really feel like doing anything, not even reading. So I learned to dwell with the Lord as I lay on the couch and prayed. I also learned to dwell with the kids as I just sat and watched whatever they were doing.

A friend and neighbor that is an herbalist was an answer to prayer for healing, providing knowledge that helped calm my body during its time of crisis. Over the months I've had other crash episodes, but armed with my herbal treatments they aren't as dramatic as the beginning and my return to health has slowly but steadily come.

In 2024 our family did the Experiencing God study. A big takeaway was to see where God is working and join Him, rather than start something yourself and ask God to join you. We began to pray that God would show us where He was working. The first week in January '25 we visited a house church and knew this was the place where God wanted our family. We spent several months getting to know people, meeting in homes, finding an exciting form of fellowship with other believers.

One of the men did an extended fast and encouraged others in the church to take days to fast and pray with him. This led to introducing our children to fasting, starting with one meal each week and slowly increasing until some of the older ones accomplished a full day fast. The kids had such pure and enthusiastic hearts in this endeavor and it created a special bond as we all did something hard together. Once, when Amy commented after a prayer time that we had prayed for almost an hour, one of them piped up and asked us to pray a little longer to make the full hour!

Amy took the oldest 5 to a bi-weekly youth group, getting to know the couple that was hosting. We then volunteered to host sometimes and lead activities. When the leading family hit some struggles we found ourselves the new youth leaders and started a study on Chivalry which went along with our schooling.

God directed us to be part of efforts to minister to the hurting family and in that process we realized that there was some unhealthy control going on from one of the church leaders. Unfortunately this realization came too late; we had already done some things that challenged that control and were stunned to be dismissed from our group. As we tried to hear people out and come to a place of reconciliation, we discovered a fuller extent of the control along with others who had been treated similarly. Our prayer became one of choosing forgiveness and a desire to 'finish well' in our exiting interactions.

This struggle with confusion, hurt and eventual understanding brought us repeatedly to our knees before the Lord. After one particularly hurtful interaction we were walking on our road, numb with shock. As we processed what happened, we looked at each other and said "I guess we should rejoice right now" and so that's what we did - we literally jumped and praised God for the trial. We were also blessed to realize the network of believers we had that gave wise counsel as we sought out what to do. Amy's dad pinpointed the

problem, a brother-in-law listened and gave counsel from his experience, a sister and a mentor helped Amy find focus. The temptation to bitterness was ever present and while we kept choosing to forgive, we still struggled with the hurt. Brian's brother walked us through some thoughts on processing the emotions and asking Jesus to bring healing.

So we end 2025 in a time of grieving. However, knowing we followed the Lord's leading gives us confidence. *"If God is for us, then who can be against us?"* (Romans 8:31) He has the next thing in store for us and it is our duty and privilege to walk in Him, no matter the cost.
